The EE shared the status of the multiple road development projects that are in progress under this state flagship programme. Under the MMUPA scheme, a total of 5 major road projects are being implemented in Chirang district through the PWD (R&B) Division, Kajalgaon. 3. These projects focus on improving rural connectivity and enhancing transport

Under the 2023–24 batch, the PWD (R&B) Division, Kajalgaon is executing 4 rural road projects spanning a total length of 28.95 km. 4. These projects are primarily focused

As of 1st July 2025, the physical progress of these projects ranges between 50% and 85%, with works in advanced stages across most sites.</p> <p>6. The bank details of two additional beneficiaries who have completed online training have been submitted to the CMAAA Society in Guwahati for the disbursement of ₹25,000, indicating that steps are being taken to ensure all eligible participants receive their entitled support.</p> <p>Furthermore, as part of a ceremonial distribution event held in Guwahati in March 2024, six beneficiaries from the total selected group have already received ₹1,00,000 each. This reflects ongoing efforts to disburse funds in a phased and organized manner, acknowledging the milestones achieved by the participants. The report highlights a steady progress in fund distribution, with only a small number of disbursements pending finalization.</p>
				The GM, APDCL apprised the house that under the PM Surya Ghar Muft Bijli Yojana in Chirang district, a total of 12,090

				<p>The Joint Director, Health expressed that the epidemiological situation report for vector-borne diseases such as Malaria, Japanese Encephalitis (JE), Acute Encephalitis Syndrome (AES), and Dengue reveals key indicators across the years 2023–24 to 2025–26 in the concerned district. The Annual Parasitic Incidence (API) has shown significant fluctuation: increasing from 0.09 in 2023–24 to 1.33 in 2024–25, then slightly dropping to 0.32 in April–May 2025–26. The</p>	

7	Social	Health	Malaria, JE, AES and Dangué	<p>number of reported cases surged from 48 in 2023–24 to 744 in 2024–25, indicating a major outbreak during that period, before recording 184 cases in April–May 2025–26. Despite the increase in cases, the total population remained consistent at approximately 559,322.</p> <p>In terms of surveillance, the Annual Blood Examination Rate (ABER), which reflects the percentage of the population screened, rose from 13% in 2023–24 to 16% in 2024–25, with a steady month-wise increase from 1% in April 2025 to 3% in April–May 2025–26. The number of blood smears examined also increased, from 71,675 in 2023–24 to 88,078 in 2024–25, and 14,362 smears in the first two months of 2025–26 alone. This reflects an enhanced effort in early diagnosis and disease surveillance. The data suggests a continued focus on strengthening vector-borne disease monitoring and control in the district, especially in response to rising case numbers in the previous year.</p>
